#### FACING DEATH WITH HOPE: A 3-WEEK STUDY

What happens after we die? Why do we hold funerals? What does our church believe about cremation and burial? These are questions many of us wonder about but often avoid talking about until we’re forced to. This fall, you are invited to join us for a three-week series that will gently and faithfully address the difficult topics of death and dying. Together, we will explore what Scripture and the church teach, why Christian funeral practices matter, and how we can look to the future with confidence and hope—because of the promise we have in Jesus Christ.

The series begins Monday, September 22 at 6:30pm and continues on September 29 and October 6. Whether you are making plans for yourself, walking with a loved one, or simply want to be strengthened in your faith, this study will provide space for honest conversation, faithful teaching, and Christ-centered hope.

#### A HISTORY OF CHRISTIANITY (BOOK STUDY)

Join us as we journey through Justo L. González’s *The Story of Christianity*, exploring the history and growth of the Christian church across two transformative eras.

## Unbreakable Hope

This past summer, we have journeyed together with the Narrative Lectionary, hearing the words of the prophet Jeremiah and the visions of John in Revelation. Week after week, we have encountered passages that speak directly into the realities of our lives—realities marked by change, uncertainty, and sometimes fear. And in every single text, a theme has echoed like a steady heartbeat: we have a God who is with us, who does not abandon us, and who promises ultimate victory over all that threatens us.

Let's be honest. Change is not easy. Whether it's change in our personal lives, changes in our community, or changes in the world around us, change often brings with it a sense of instability. We find ourselves wondering, "What will tomorrow look like?" "Will I have what I need?" "How will this affect the people I love?" The unknown can make us anxious. Fear can creep in.

And yet, in the midst of all this, God gives us his Word, and his Word gives us hope. Not a shallow, "Don't worry, everything will be fine" kind of hope. But a hope grounded in the faithfulness of God.

This past summer, we heard those promises in Jeremiah, a prophet who spoke to God's people in one of the most unsettling times in their history. The people of Judah were facing exile. Their way of life was crumbling. The temple, which was the visual sign of God's presence among them, would soon be destroyed. If there was ever a time for despair, that was it. And yet, what did God say through Jeremiah?

*The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise that I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah.*  
—Jeremiah 33:14.

Even when everything familiar was being torn away, God spoke a word of promise. "There is a future. There is hope."

Jeremiah told the people about a new covenant, a new promise not on stone tablets, but on human hearts (Jeremiah 31:31-34). He spoke of a righteous Branch from the line of David who would bring justice and righteousness. In other words, even in the midst of exile, God was saying, "I am not done with you. I will not leave you in despair. I am with you, and I will bring life out of death."

That same heartbeat of hope pulses through our readings in Revelation we have worked through in August. Revelation is a book that can seem strange and even frightening at first glance, with its visions of beasts and battles. But at its core, Revelation is a book of hope for people under pressure. It was written to Christians in the

first century who were facing persecution, who were wondering if following Jesus was worth it, who were tempted to give in to fear.

And what did John's vision show them? The Lamb at the center of the throne (Revelation 5), the One who is worthy to open the scroll and unfold history. John revealed a countless multitude standing before the throne, clothed in white robes, waving palm branches, a picture of ultimate victory and joy (Revelation 7). John wrote of the new heaven and new earth where God dwells with his people, where every tear is wiped away and death is no more (Revelation 21).

Over and over, Revelation whispers (and sometimes shouts), "The Lamb wins." No matter how strong evil seems, no matter how dark the night gets, Jesus is victorious. He is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end, and nothing can snatch us out of his hand.

So what does this all mean for us today? It means that in the midst of our changes and challenges, whether it's changes in our families, changes in the church, changes in our nation, or changes in the world, we do not face them alone. The God who made promises to Jeremiah's people is the same God who holds you now. The Christ who triumphed in Revelation is the same Christ who walks with you today.

It also means that our hope is not fragile. Our hope is not based on everything going smoothly or turning out the way we want. Our hope is anchored in something deeper. Our hope is in the unchanging character of God and the unbreakable promise of the Gospel.

This does not make the hard things easy. God's people still went into the exile. The first Christians still faced persecution. And we still face challenges in our own lives. But we face them differently because we know the end of the story. We know the God who promises, "See, I am making all things new." (Revelation 21:5).

As we look to this fall and beyond, may you always hear that heartbeat of hope. The story is not over. The same God who promised a new covenant in Jeremiah, the same Christ who reigns as the Lamb in Revelation, is with you today. And nothing can separate you from his love.

So take heart, my siblings in Christ. Whatever you are carrying, whatever unknowns you are facing, hear this good news: You are not alone. You are held by the One who is making all things new. And in him, and him alone, your future is secure. And for that, we can exclaim, "Thanks be to God!"

They provide aid in emergencies and help families restore their lives. They partner with communities to build and grow rural economies. They break the cycle of poverty, so families and communities can thrive.

The goal of LWR is to help people build self-sufficiency and create new community-owned approaches to problem solving that will last long after LWR projects end.
